Agreement between Landlord and S'wich Cafe for Cultivate Garden Space

1.0 Proposal

1.1 Introduction/Background:

Cultivate is a collaborative project by a team of five senior students at Emily Carr University of Art & Design. The team came together to apply for an artist call for the design of a garden space incorporating public art and urban agriculture for a new condominium development in South-East False Creek. Our research and collaboration thus far has led us to realize the impact that access to food-growing space and participation in community activities around growing food not only build social capital but can also foster strong and healthy communities. We would like to apply our research and design effort to other settings, namely, S'Wich Cafe.

1.2 Purpose and Objectives:

We hope to transform the underused yard space behind S'Wich Cafe into a venue for food production and community events. This will necessitate a unique, volunteer-run system that benefits the owner of the space, and also contributes fresh produce to both a volunteer base and a local social venture such as the Harvest Project. *Cultivate* has developed a relationship with the Edible Garden Project in order to benefit from their experience in this area on the North Shore.

1.3 Relationship to Strategic Plan:

S'Wich Cafe states in its mandate that a relationship to the community is important, as is using locally sourced sustainable ingredients in the food served. Creating a community sharing garden in the underused yard space behind the cafe would help achieve these goals in a very tangible way. Not only would a garden allow the Cafe to incorporate organic food, grown on-site, into the menu -- creating a valuable revenue stream and marketing opportunity -- but it would also provide a place for the community to come together to work, play and learn while promoting a healthy lifestyle.

1.4 Membership Segments/External Audiences Reached:

Primary involvement in the space will be overseen by S'Wich Cafe and staff, with the appointment of a volunteer Network Coordinator to facilitate the management of the garden. The Network Coordinator will be responsible for scheduling and overseeing volunteer shifts, with the help of a web system provided by *Cultivate*. Local residents and customers of S'Wich Cafe make up our secondary audience and volunteer base, and will need to be engaged with the process from the outset. Tertiary audiences include the network of the social venture partnership that will be developed through the *Cultivate* program. By providing in-kind donations to a social venture the S'Wich Cafe brand will gain more exposure and potentially increase its market share.

1.5 Project Deliverables e.g. Value/Benefits/Messages:

Cultivate believes that access to a shared garden space will help continue the development of a healthy living community in the vicinity of S'Wich Cafe by providing a space for residents to come together and engage in light work within walking distance of their homes.

Although the city is located in close proximity to some of the world's richest agricultural lands, the vast majority of our food is imported from across the globe. Agriculturally productive lands are destroyed by urban sprawl, and one in ten Canadian households are food insecure. A means of increasing the resilience of the region's food system is to support the development of local and provincial food production. The creation of collaborative gardens will help to catalyze a change in the way we view our underused spaces and demonstrate their use as hubs of urban food production.

A collaborative garden also helps to build community and create a place for people to learn about growing food and gardening. Such sites have the potential to become the epicentre for intergenerational learning experiences which can cultivate experimentation and create opportunities for teaching specific gardening techniques and plant organizational systems.

The collaborative gardening model also supports the many programs currently in existence in North Vancouver which are managed by the many non-profit groups and urban agricultural projects. These organizations are often small and well connected to the surrounding communities. Groups like: the North Shore Transition Village (www.villagevancouver.ca/group/village-north-vancouver) the North Shore Harvest Project (www.harvestproject.org) New Hope Cuisine (www.newhopecuisine.com/new-hope-cuisine-2) and Edible Garden Projects (www.ediblegardenproject.com) are all possible partners and beneficiaries of this program.

Volunteers will directly benefit from participation in the shared garden, not only in the acquisition of fresh, tasty and nutritious food, but also through access to educational workshops planned for the space at low or no cost, as well as increased social capital within the community. Customers of S'Wich Cafe will also benefit from the space, especially during the summer months, as *Cultivate* aims to design a space that invites social interaction and provides a comfortable place to relax and enjoy food and drinks from the Cafe, which will also contain fresher, tastier and more nutritious ingredients.

1.6 Project Scope and Possible Execution:

This project can be accomplished to varied degrees depending on the level of involvement of S'Wich Cafe management, input and engagement of neighbours and local residents and, of course, how much funding can be acquired. Partnering with a local social venture is a good way to open fundraising channels, recruit volunteers and get community buy-in as well.

Some of the elements *Cultivate* is currently researching are raised growing beds, water catchment, permaculture food forests, urban chickens, children's play areas, educational spaces, patio space for the cafe, aquaponics, and rain gardens.

Implementing a small number of beds to begin with is one way to go, requiring only a small amount of in-kind donations from landscape suppliers or financial contributions from donors or fundraising efforts. However, the *Cultivate* team thinks that even before the garden is constructed, the community should be invited to the Cafe to give their opinions about what they feel the space could provide for them. This will allow *Cultivate* and S'Wich to gauge interest in the project and design programming and events based on what the community needs.

1.7 Timeline:

The *Cultivate* team will hold a community co-design event at S'Wich Cafe on January 24, 2013. This will require support from S'Wich management in the form of permission to host the event, space in the Cafe to accommodate participants, and potentially in-kind donations of coffee or light refreshments for participants. After the event, a debrief meeting should be held with S'Wich management and *Cultivate* to finalize the timeline going forward. Meanwhile, *Cultivate* will explore fundraising opportunities and create landscape plans for the transformation of the space.

The *Cultivate* team must have certain project deliverables for the Emily Carr University Graduation Show prepared by early February, including a conceptual design of the space and system designed to manage volunteers and the relationship with the social venture. Fundraising efforts can go on parallel to this and *Cultivate* will commit to overseeing the volunteer recruitment, fundraising and event planning needed to install the garden, with the goal of breaking ground in April 2013 and being operational by May-June 2013.

1.8 Measurement/Evaluation (Accomplishment of Objectives):

We can estimate if the project will be successful by evaluating the initial community engagement event in January. Measures such as attendance of the event, level of commitment and possibly amounts collected from fundraising at the event can tell us if the project will be well-received by the community.

Once the garden is operational, tangible measures such as the potential yield of the space can be calculated, and will depend upon the operational budget. Additionally, attendance at community events and educational workshops, as well as increased sales for the Cafe are important metrics to consider.

1.9 Possible Complications/Challenges:

Possible challenges include lack of support from the neighboring community as well as issues such as security and wildlife. We hope that by engaging the community from the outset of the project we can overcome this potential barrier. We may also consider the inclusion of a locked gate system into the design and budget for the space. However, many homes in the area have unlocked food gardens and it seems that security may not be a big concern.

1.10 Responsibilities and Coordination:

The *Cultivate* team is willing to commit, free of charge, to: hosting a community engagement

event in January; designing a conceptual landscape plan for the space (with input from S'Wich management and in response to feedback from the community); creating a budget for the implementation of the garden; engaging potential social venture partners and building a relationship for collaboration with the S'Wich garden space; fundraising to meet the budgetary requirements in the form of monetary or in-kind donations to build the garden; recruiting a team of volunteers to work in the garden; recruiting a Network Coordinator to manage the space; and, finally, providing a web tool to assist with the ongoing management and coordination of the garden.

S'Wich management will provide support in the form of a limited number of meetings to review plans and progress and facilitation of agreements with the landlord including a commitment to allow the space to be used for food production and community events in partnership with a social venture for a minimum of two years. We also require that all process and design work be reported on and displayed publicly as our Emily Carr University Graduation Project and Intellectual Property.

2.0 Terms and Conditions

Tenant is S'wich Cafe and Cultivate Garden Space, and Landlord is Baywest Management and the Landlord proper.

2.1 Approvals

Tennant will secure and pay for any required City approvals.

2.2 Water

Tenant will supplement water usage for the garden with rainwater catchment, and will not require additional water use or affect the utility costs for the unit. In the event that more water is needed, tenant will pay the increased utility costs.

2.3 Infrastructure

Infrastructure will include raised beds, a small, secure tool shed, a compost system, a tank for rainwater collection and a simple irrigation system to use the rainwater. Pavers will be used when necessary to make the planting areas accessible for individuals of varied mobility, and to create a patio section for workshops and learning. The shed and any small structures such as potting benches, tables and chairs etc. will be portable.

2.4 Planting

Planting will include primarily vegetables with some fruit and flowers and will be monitored and maintained by the garden coordinator with the help of community volunteers. The garden will be organic. No pesticides or chemical fertilizers will be used.

2.5 Maintenance & Waste

Tenant will be responsible for maintenance of all infrastructure, including any additional waste hauling that may be required during the installation of the garden. The inclusion of a compost will ensure that garden waste is kept within a closed system and no organic waste from the garden will go into the existing waste stream.

2.6 Access & Security

The garden will be publicly accessible during hours of operation of S'Wich Cafe. Fencing can be erected at the tenant expense if security becomes a problem for the neighbours or other tenants.

2.7 Events

Events will include educational workshops and community dining events, hosted and monitored by S'Wich Cafe, with a maximum attendance of 30 participants.

2.8 Insurance & Indemnity

Tenant will be responsible for insurance and will include the landlords name as an insured party before any infrastructure is installed on the property. This insurance coverage will indemnify the landlord and management from any increase in liability.

2.9 Termination

All infrastructure will be removed, restoring the land to it's original condition at termination of the land use agreement or at termination of the lease, with the option to extend the land use agreement at that time. The landlord will notify the tenant of any change in land ownership, development, or use 60 days prior to the change in status.

3.0 Land Use Agreement for S'Wich Cafe

I, _____, give permission to Erik Smith, owner of S'Wich Cafe to use the property located directly behind 644 Queensbury Avenue, North Vancouver, as a community gardening project for the term of _____ years beginning April 1, 2013 and ending _____.

This agreement may be renewed with the approval of both the property owner and the community garden organization at the end of the agreement period. All questions about the community garden, its nature, risks or hazards, have been discussed with the garden coordinator to my satisfaction.

The community garden agrees to indemnify and save the property owner from all damages and

claims arising out of any act, omission or neglect by the community garden, and from any and all actions or causes of action arising from the community garden's occupation or use of the property.

As the property owner, I agree to notify the community gardening organization of any change in land ownership, development, or use 60 days prior to the change in status.



Dear Kevin,

I am part of a collaborative project called *Cultivate* put together by four senior students from Emily Carr University of Art and Design (ecuad.ca), and we are hoping to enlist the support of Windsor Plywood in the construction of a sharing garden in North Vancouver. Our research has led us to realize that participation in collaborative food gardening can positively impact the lives of people in the communities involved, especially children and youth. Learning how to grow food teaches young people the language of sustainability and fosters an attitude of respect for the environment as well as for one another. It is with this in mind that *Cultivate* has proposed to transform an underused yard space behind S'Wich Cafe (swich.ca) in the Queensbury neighbourhood into a venue for a collaborative food garden and community events, with a focus on educational programming for neighbourhood children and youth.

The garden is intended to use chemical free techniques to produce fresh, organic produce, a portion of which will be given back to the community of volunteers and participants through events and workshops. The majority of produce from the garden will be donated to low income families on the North Shore through the Harvest Project, who have established a successful program for peripheral groups on the North Shore (harvestproject.org). Additionally, founders of the Edible Garden Project (ediblegardenproject.com) as well as the Youth Programming Manager for the North Shore Neighbourhood House (nsh.bc.ca) have provided support and guidance for the *Cultivate* team. We hope that this proposal may be the first of many gardens built to nurture sustainable and healthy communities by engaging young people and their families.

To build the Queensbury garden, *Cultivate* is relying on cash and in-kind donations from local residents and business owners. We intend to credit corporate sponsors through on-site signage, visibility on our project web site (cultivateprojects.com) and social media channels as well as display in the Emily Carr University graduation exhibition. We would like to extend a request for any in-kind donations of lumber that you may be able to provide to help us build raised beds for the garden. The team has proposed a design for the space, including 16 cedar raised beds in its ideal form. I've included our plans for you to review as well the raised bed design specifications. We would be happy to start smaller and build as many beds as we can to kick start the growing season and begin donating fresh produce to the Harvest Project. We are also open to altering our design to accommodate material donations of varied sizes. The most important thing to us is to get this project on the ground, and any materials donation you may be able to offer would be invaluable. Please let me know by phone or email if this is something that Windsor Plywood is willing to consider.






To Whom It May Concern:

Cultivate is a collaborative food garden design project by a team of four senior students at Emily Carr University of Art + Design. Our research has led us to realize that collaborative food gardening positively impacts the communities involved. Initiatives like this can be especially beneficial to children and youth. Learning how to grow food teaches young people the language of sustainability and fosters an attitude of respect for the environment as well as for one another. It is with this in mind that *Cultivate*, in partnership with the North Shore Neighbourhood House, has proposed to transform an underused yard space behind the shops at 644 Queensbury Avenue into a venue for a collaborative food garden and community events, with a focus on educational programming for neighbourhood children and youth.

A collaborative food garden is different from a community garden because the harvest is shared. In our garden, we will use chemical-free techniques to produce fresh, organic produce, a portion of which will be given back to the community of volunteers and participants through events and workshops. The majority of produce from the garden will be donated to low income families on the North Shore through the Harvest Project, who have established a successful program for peripheral groups on the North Shore (<http://www.harvestproject.org/>).

Local food security is an increasingly urgent issue as various factors destabilize the dependability and quality of our food supply. The beauty of this project is that as it helps bolster the North Shore's long-term food security, it also draws the people of the community together in rewarding social exchanges and meaningful work, with the primary beneficiaries being children and youth. The garden will be a safe and stimulating place for children to play and learn, but will also provide youth with opportunities to initiate projects in conjunction with their local schools and the community at large. Young people will have a space to collaborate with others as they learn about urban agriculture and the myriad ways it can positively touch the lives of others. Moreover, this project will serve people from marginalized groups through food donations and opportunities to volunteer.

The garden will be a community gathering place, which will increase social capital across the North Shore; here, people from different walks of life can come together to share their skills with others and form creative partnerships, which will maximize community resources. The garden will help address many needs of the community -- economic, educational, nutritional and social -- while also making the North Shore just a little more pleasant than it already is.



Grant Applications:

We applied for three grants for the garden, each requiring thorough written responses and concise budgeting.

Programming for the garden will primarily target families with children and promote active community participation and intergenerational learning. To do this effectively, *Cultivate* intends to host a youth engagement event in collaboration with the North Shore Neighbourhood House. This event will include workshops and playful activities for children of various age groups, centered on the theme of growing food and designed to let participants give input into what they may want to learn or how they may best contribute to the collaborative gardening space.

Going forward, "Youth Days" will become a focus of garden programming, and *Cultivate* intends to collaborate with various urban agriculture organizations in the lower mainland, such as the Edible Garden Project, Victory Gardens, Fresh Roots Urban Farm, Can You Dig It and others to provide mentorship and skill-sharing for our garden participants. Additionally, our partnership with the North Shore Neighbourhood House has opened up opportunities to connect directly to North Shore schools and youth groups and potentially offer programming that directly addresses the needs and desires of the local youth. For example, the North Shore Neighbourhood House would like to provide one-on-one mentorship and garden therapy for youth with anxiety or depression issues in the garden. *Cultivate* will also offer culinary arts courses that begin in the garden and move into the S'wich Cafe where Erik Smith (owner and Red Seal Chef) would teach youth how to harvest, prepare and serve local, organic and delicious meals direct from the garden.

Cultivate and the North Shore Neighbourhood House are excited to break ground this spring and funding for this project through the Youth Philanthropy Council would greatly help us in this endeavor! We hope that this proposal may be the first of many gardens built to nurture sustainable and healthy communities by engaging young people and their families.




