In this studio course students are introduced to concepts and processes specific to illustrating for time-based media. Using a variety of tools and materials in both wet and dry media, students learn composition, illustrative methods, and modes of conveying movement and transitions at the drawing board stage. The process of translating verbal materials to the visual realm, and of expressing abstract or symbolic concepts through illustration, is explored in depth.

Course Content [for this specific offering of this course]

This studio course explores various techniques of using traditional (drawing, watercolor, gouache) and new media in the development of advanced skills as they apply to illustration. Students will conduct an exploration of the storytelling power of illustration, with the emphasis on the research and drawing skills needed to develop strong characters in sequential imagery. Through a series of projects and discussions, students will develop professional standards and produce finished portfolio pieces. Class structure allows demonstrations of process and experimentation and critique with illustrative media.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Interpret subjects in various techniques and different media.
- Brainstorm, conceptualize and execute ideas.
- Apply and improve design skills as pertaining to illustration.
- Apply illustration to various concepts and requirements.
- Utilize various creative concepts, strategies, materials and tools.
- Utilize reference and resource material and apply research procedures.
- Analyze various illustration styles to improve individual skills and to create a personal styl

Resource materials

- Loose-leaf binder to store notes and handouts.
- Portfolio: buy one or make it yourself.
- Drawing board (optional) with clips or masking tape to attach paper.
- Brush for drawing. Recommended: Windsor-Newton series 7 sizes #1 and #2
- Brush for ink wash: round sable or good synthetic brush, size #6 - #10
- Ink: Windsor-Newton black India Ink. Waterproof ink, selection of colored inks.
- Plastic mixing tray for mixing ink washes
- Water jar
- Soft cloth for wiping pens and brushes (chamois or similar)
- Pen holders (one for standard-point dip pen nibs and one for crowquill nibs)
- Standard metal nibs: buy an assortment of flexible and rigid points.
- 5 sheets of Strathmore Series 500 vellum or plate finish bristol paper, 3-ply or higher. The sheets are about 20 x 30". An alternative is Rising Artist Drawing Bristol, 3 or 4 ply, plate or vellum finish, 22 x 30" sheets.
- Drawing pencils, selection.
- Pencil sharpener or knife.
- Staedtler Mars white plastic eraser
- Erasing shield

Also useful:

- Art box or toolbox to protect your supplies while transporting them.
- Pentel automatic pencil (PD347), .7 mm HB leads (office supply store)
- Pentel Clic eraser (retractable) with white plastic eraser refills (office supply store)
- Assortment of drawing templates, Stencil sheets
- Ruler, triangle, t-square

Evaluation Criteria definitions

The classes are mainly structured to studio work so attendance is absolutely essential to success. There is an emphasis on observation and representation as a large amount of time is devoted to drawing directly from life. All the same, the merits of drawing from memory, imagination and from various types of collected reference material are not overlooked. The students are expected to maintain at least one sketchbook and one scrapbook in which all manner of resource and reference can be stored and organized. In class, basic exercises will gradually become more studied and ambitious and eventually culminate in extended final projects. A number of homework assignments and one ongoing term project will round out the program.

Critiques, group discussions and slide presentations are integrated into the routine. A final grade is based upon observable progress and class participation, completed assignments and a final folio submission.
