

Gustave Courbet (1819-1877)

- Beginning of the "avant-garde"
- "show me an angel and I'll paint one"
- Father of realism
- Influenced the later impressionists
- Political revolutionary--Paris
 Commune of 1871




Stone Breakers, 1849-50

- Bridge between Realism and Impressionism
- Leader of the Impressionists, reluctantly
- Never exhibited with Impressionists
- Continued to focus on the official Salons





- Rejected from the Salon of 1863













- Realist






Edgar Degas

• "No art was ever less spontaneous than mine. What I do is the result of reflection and study of the great masters; of inspiration, spontaneity, temperament . . . I know nothing."

Degas

- Movement
- Took part in impressionist exhibitions but style is very different
- Idolized Ingres
- Interested in classical draftsmanship
- Studied Classical art
- After meeting Manet, changed subjects to everyday life













Degas after the bath








Thomas Eakins (1844-1916)

- Born in Philly
- Anatomical studies
- Collaborated with Muybridge
- Science and art
- *The Gross Clinic*, 1875
- "If America is to produce great painters, remain in America to peer deeper into the heart of American life."
- Scandal at the PA Academy of Fine Arts


James Abbott McNeill Whistler (1834-1903)

- Inspired by Courbet
- Also influenced by Dutch and Spanish Baroque
- American, but lived in England and France
- Flamboyant personality--dandy
- Lived lavish lifestyle, in debt
- Believed in idea of "art for art's sake"
- Often gave pieces musical titles
- Also associated with impressionists




Symphony in White, No. One, 1862






